We are delighted to welcome Heather Thompson as our new Year 3/4 teacher. We also extend a warm welcome to Jasmine Ware, our new AIEW, along with Jack Neale, Raquel Caldwell, and Maria Tsikouris, who have joined our Inclusion Team





We are also pleased to welcome a few new students who have joined us this term—Hawaiki and Amazon-Reign. I know you will all make them feel very welcome.

Last week our students participated in our **mission liturgy and markets**. A chance for us to focus on those in Zambia and raise awareness and funds for those in need. We thank you for your support with this. Over \$2000 was raised as a result of your support - thank you

Thank you to everyone who took the time to complete our **Tell Them From Me** online survey. Your feedback is greatly valued and appreciated. We are now reflecting on what is working well and identifying areas for growth as part of our ongoing strategic planning.

With input from parents, students, and staff, several key themes have emerged that will guide our focus moving forward:

Technology and Digital Learning

- Computer Lab & Wi-Fi Improvements We have met with Catholic Education NT (CENT) and Area 9 to begin the process of upgrading our computer lab and improving Wi-Fi access, scheduled for 2026.
- New Staff Devices All teachers will receive new desktop computers suited to their professional needs this process is already underway.
- Digital Literacy Focus We have requested support from CENT to enhance staff development in this area.

Communication and Class Placement

• Families have requested to know their child's class teacher before the school year begins. Due to enrolments continuing through January, class structures can only be finalised once school resumes. We understand this is not ideal, but appreciate your understanding as we accommodate new families moving to Darwin.

Student Facilities

• Construction of new student toilets is currently underway and will be completed by the end of November.

Student Learning and Support

- We are working closely with CENT to strengthen extension and enrichment opportunities for students.
- Students shared positive feedback about PE, Indonesian, and The Arts thank you to Abby Caldwell, Jo Masters, Putu Warti, and Leah Ergos for their wonderful work.
- There is also interest in expanding Science offerings, which we are exploring as a potential STEAM focus for 2026.

School Culture and Environment

- It was wonderful to hear feedback that our school is welcoming and inclusive for new students and families. We will continue to build on this strength.
- Students have asked for a review of playground equipment, including more swings we'll explore this in future planning.
- We recognise the increasing workload on staff and are working with CENT to identify ways to better support teachers.

Communication & Canteen

- We are simplifying communication by reducing the number of platforms we use by next year, we aim to consolidate through Toddle.
- Families have suggested more canteen options on Fridays please share your ideas with us!

All feedback from the survey has been shared with staff and will be discussed with our School Board. The themes above represent the areas most frequently mentioned, and our leadership team will continue to review additional points raised.

Transition Year 1/2 Year 3/4 Year 5/6

Today we welcomed our 2026 Transition students for our school readiness program - *Footsteps in Faith and Learning*. The aim of the program is to familiarise students and their families with our facilities and to experience fun and engaging learning activities that introduce them to the environment, routines, and structure of a primary school.

If you have not yet submitted an enrolment application for 2026 for Transition or another year level, please do so soon. If you know families with a child eligible for Transition next year, encourage them to contact our front office. Our leadership team is always happy to speak with new families.

If your circumstances have changed and you will not be **returning to Holy Spirit in 2026**, please notify us in writing. Or complete our online <u>Termination of Enrolment form</u>. This assists us in preparation of the new school year when confirming staffing and number of classes. We are currently working with our teachers to finalise class structures for next year, and with early notification this allows us to lock in our teachers and inform them of their class.

We are fortunate to have Laura McCormack as our **school counsellor** from Catholic Care. Laura meets with many of our students during this time which is funded by our school. With the increased needs of support for our students and families, we have Laura with us for a five-day fortnight. While there is a waiting list, we still encourage you as parents to utilise this service where you see the need. The referral form is available in our front office. Please know that counselling sessions are confidential and that the conversations between your child and the counsellor will be shared with you alone.

Our teachers are in the process of finalising assessment and data in readiness of your child's academic report which will be sent to you all prior to the end of our school year. I remind you all the importance of **regular school attendance**. Every day at school counts. Please refer to the table as provided through our newsletter on page 7 as an indicator of how repeated absences can have an impact on student learning and their results.

I take the time to remind you all the importance of keeping **cool and hydrated** as the heat and humidity rise. It is important that our children come to school with a water bottle each day, including their school hat to wear when outside. In addition, a good night's sleep is important for us all. Our library is open during lunch for our children who wish to stay away from the heat and join in some quiet activities in the air-conditioning. We thank you for your support around this.


Championing Inclusion at the NT Catholic Education Inclusion Forum

Miss Shinobu and I had the privilege of attending a two-day Inclusion Forum with Inclusion Support Practitioners (ISPs) and Inclusion Support Coordinators (ISCs) from across the Catholic Education NT Network. We dived into inspiring discussions about supporting students through key transitions—whether it's starting primary school, moving year to year, or stepping into middle school.

We also explored ways to extend and support our gifted and talented students, strengthen support processes, and make the most of NCCD data. Plus, we focused on celebrating our students and families with language backgrounds other than English, including our English as a Second Language/Dialect learners.

A special highlight was affirming conversations around the importance of Soundfield Systems in our classrooms to ensure every voice is heard. The forum was a fantastic opportunity to lean into our connections, share ideas, and strengthen our network to better support every student across our schools.




